Building Uganda's Climate Education Movement

A new hybrid capacity-building programme places teachers at the centre of climate resilience, one classroom at a time.

Yanayi Haki Afriqya officially launched the Climate Change Integration for Educators (CCIE) programme on 8 May 2026 in Kampala. The launch convened educators, government representatives, development partners, media practitioners, and climate advocates around a shared vision: positioning education at the centre of climate resilience and action.

CCIE is a pioneering six-month hybrid programme designed to equip educators with practical climate literacy, innovative pedagogical approaches, and community engagement skills, enabling them to weave climate education across subjects and learning environments. The inaugural cohort draws its members from early childhood, primary, secondary, and teacher-training institutions alike.

Beyond strengthening classroom practice, CCIE seeks to establish schools as centres of climate resilience and community engagement. The journey has begun, and the impact is already taking root in classrooms, communities, and conversations across Uganda.

This quarter, Yanayi Haki Afriqya (YHA), represented by founder Hamira Kobusingye, actively contributed to the 64th Sessions of the UN Climate Change Subsidiary Bodies (SB64) in Bonn, Germany, using the platform to champion Africa's climate priorities ahead of COP31.

Through a policy brief and position statement, YHA called for climate action that goes beyond commitments to real implementation, emphasising the urgent need for accessible climate finance, stronger support for adaptation and loss and damage, a just transition, and meaningful participation of youth, women, Indigenous Peoples, and frontline communities in climate decision-making.

YHA also highlighted the critical role of climate education through initiatives such as the CCIE programme, reinforcing that empowered and informed communities are essential to building resilience.

As negotiations continue toward COP31, YHA remains committed to ensuring that Africa's voice is heard, and that global climate decisions deliver tangible benefits for the communities most affected by the climate crisis.

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Africa does not need more promises. Africa needs delivery.

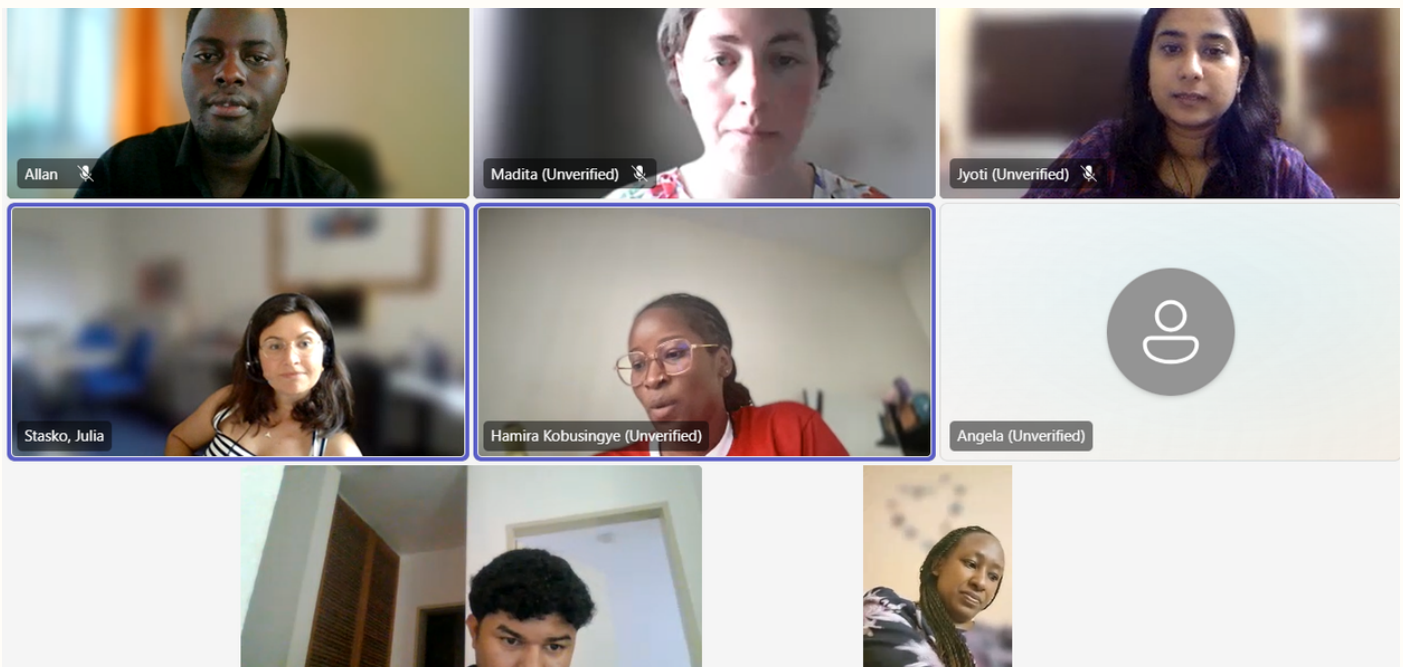

Youth4Hope Fellowship Begins a Journey of Global Collaboration

A fifteen-month fellowship connecting young leaders across four continents in shared pursuit of hope and sustainable development.

The Youth4Hope Fellowship officially started on 7 May 2026, bringing together young leaders from Africa, Asia, Europe, and Latin America for a 15-month journey of learning, leadership, and collaboration. The hybrid fellowship blends virtual and physical engagements, fostering knowledge sharing, cross-cultural exchange, and meaningful connections that are laying the foundation for a global network of young changemakers.

Uganda was originally selected to host the fellowship's first international physical encounter in July, with Yanayi Haki Afriqya serving as one of the host partners alongside organisations from Bolivia, Germany, and India. Due to the Ebola outbreak in Uganda, the gathering was relocated to India and rescheduled to September, to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all participants.

Building Africa's Next Generation of Climate Leaders

CBSSCAP's second cohort is turning learning into action across six African countries.

The Capacity Building and Skills Sharing for Climate Activists Programme (CBSSCAP) continues to equip emerging climate leaders across Africa with the knowledge, skills, and networks needed to drive meaningful climate action. Building on the success of its inaugural cohort, the programme attracted over 530 applications, with 50 participants selected from six African countries for Cohort II.

Now halfway through the programme, participants have completed modules on climate science, climate justice, and climate diplomacy, while already putting their learning into practice through community awareness campaigns, advocacy, and public education initiatives that have collectively reached more than 10,000 people. As participants prepare for the final modules on project design, climate finance, and leadership, CBSSCAP continues to build a growing network of African climate leaders committed to advancing locally driven, climate justice-centred solutions.
